With all this going on, the number of available tournament directors dwindled down, and we were also short of volunteers for tasks such as sending out flyers or doing the newsletter.

Happily, we found a new home in May: the Kennedy Senior Center in downtown Natick. While I regret moving from the town of our namesake, the site is a wonderful place to play chess:

- We're the only people there on Tuesday nights.
- We have our own set of keys to gain access to the facility.
- It's a clean, no-smoking facility in an excellent neighborhood with lots of free parking.
- There are vending machines for soda and candy, plus a full kitchen with coffee machine.
- The main room can accommodate about 30 boards, with two other rooms for skittles.

The only down side is that some of our long time members may have difficulty getting transportation to Natick. I will get information out in the near future so that we can work together to help all our members get to and from the new club location.

Now we can settle in and make the renamed Framingham/Metrowest Chess Club once again one of the strongest chess clubs in New England. If you're rusty, don't worry, there are plenty of fish in our little pond, it's just a question of how long you'll be one of them. Stop by the club -- the sharks are hungry!
